


Tracking, Searching Course Planned in State College

A tracking and searching workshop with Glen R. Johnson from Windsor, Ontario, is being presented this weekend at the Holiday Inn, State College, by the Nita-Nee Kennel Club.

Mr. Johnson is an assistant master at the St. Clair College of Applied Arts and Technology and is the author of the book, "Tracking Dog, Theory and Methods." He conducts regular training classes in dog obedience, tracking and personal protection, offers special workshops on advanced scent work in the summers and has headed many research projects on canine olfaction.

A tracking dog is trained to follow. without deviation, the trail of a man, left several hours previously. The dog wears a nonrestrictive harness and light line and works 20 to 30 feet ahead of his handler without direction.

A searching dog seeks out and indicates objects with a specific odor, with or without direction from his handler. The odor may be human scent, drugs, explosives or other. This dog wears the harness but works off

In 1975 two of Mr. Johnson's German shepherds were used in an entomology research project for Michigan State University. They were trained to search for and indicate gypsy moth egg masses in the forest areas of Winter State Park, Pa. The purpose was not to

try to control the moth but locate colonies that were just starting so that the insect could be studied at low population levels. An egg mass has so little odor that it cannot be measured on a gas chromatograph or by spectroscope. Some scientists believe that the gypsy moth egg masses possess no odor at all.

A solution was made of crushed egg masses and distilled water. It was then strained and the dogs were trained to locate it in ever reduced amounts until they could indicate an actual mass on a piece of bark or stone. The masses measured from 1 centimeter to 1 inch across. The dogs scented egg masses a few feet below the surface on the underside of boulders where the female moth had managed to crawl when she laid them, on the sides of oak trees where the folds of bark had completely grown over each other and on the underside of tiny laurel branches, three feet above the ground.

No one had used the canine olfactory system as a biological detection device in the field on entomology before this study. It now remains for others to utilize this method and begin exploration of the possibilities of training dogs to locate other harmful insects for control purposes.

The tracking workshop today covers objectives, equipment and training

techniques. Tomorrow, the indoor searching workshop will include characteristics of search behavior, search patterns, directed and free search and searching in commercial and industrial areas. This will be followed by outdoor demonstrations.

A tracking match will follow the workshop on Monday to certify the trained dogs. Certification is necessary for one to enter an American Kennel Club Tracking Trial.

U.S. Army Breeds a Superdog-After 8 Years, \$1.8 Million & 1,996 Puppies!

The U.S. Army has bred healthier, more reliable German shepherd dogs for sniffing out drugs and bombs — after eight years, \$1.8 million and 1,996 puppies.

"I think the public is going to benefit a lot from the breeding techniques

we've developed,' declared Maj. Jeffrey M. Linn, the veterinarian deputy director of the project.

The improved German shepherd, Linn said, is easier to train for police and military work, more reliable in detecting bombs and contraband and has a much lower rate of dysplasia, a congenital hip defect among German shepherds.

In fact, Linn noted, the hip dysplasia rate was down to 19 percent by the end of the Army program. The defect generally strikes more than 50 percent of the breed and usually disqualifies victims as a working dog, he said.

A team of three veterinarians, a geneticist and 27 enlisted men worked on the project from late 1968 until last June 30 in three former warehouses at the sprawling Aberdeen Proving Ground in Maryland.

The researchers crossbred the offspring of two pedigreed German shepherds in a line through four generations, that eventually produced 1,996 puppies.

One "granddaddy" produced dogs free from hip dysplasia but with a sluggish temperament; the other sired offspring with a crackling temperament but a higher incidence of the hip defect. The trick was to get the best from both lines.

And after eight years, Linn said, the Army felt the project "had come close enough to its goals" to disband the Aberdeen unit so that the people in the field who actually use and train the dogs could take over:

The dogs have already been trained to detect hidden narcotics at the U.S. Customs Service kennels in Front Royal, Va. — and the results have been speciacular

spectacular.
"Whatever the Army has done to breed these animals has worked admirably," said a delighted Gene Kerven, basic training course supervisor at the kennels.

"The dogs have an extreme desire to retrieve, get along extremely well with other animals and don't show any signs of outward aggression toward people.

"The fact that they are less prone to hip dysplasia is remarkable in itself."





Mounted Team Works with Police

Mounted Search and Rescue Team look

In 1971, when a small boy was reported lost along the Millstone River, local horsemen offered their assistance in the search. This was the beginning of the Mounted Search and Rescue Team of Somerset County. Since then the 18 member team, which is associated with the Somerset Horse and Pony Association, has been called out by local police on numerous occasions to aid in the search for missing persons.

A mounted search unit is especially helpful in the Hillsborough and Montgomery areas of Somerset County. Hillsborough's sparsely populated 54 square miles present wide expanses of open land dotted with woods and underbrush, the Sourland Mountains and several rivers. Hunters have lost their bearings in isolated areas and patients from the Carrier Clinic in Montgomery have wandered off on occasion.

Both police and First Aid units have come to depend on the help this mounted squad can give. In addition to saving time during a search, it is estimated a rider and horse can do the work of eight men on foot and a man or woman on horseback is able to be more observant from the vantage point of the horse's back, especially in areas with high, thick underbrush. The horse too is helpful. It can be as good as a dog in sensing persons in the dark. Horses are keen to respond to anything different or unusual. The horseman who knows his horse can easily detect a tenseness or change in the horse's attitude which can alert him to the

presence of the missing person.

However, just having a horse isn't enough to warrant membership in this all volunteer unit which is available for rescue operations any place in Somerset County. The rider must be able to demonstrate complete control of his horse and must attend drills and meetings once a month. He is required to have his own tack, rain gear and horse transportation ready to roll at all times. Riders are expected to have good "horse" sense" and horses must remain dependable and steady despite the sound of sirens, the hovering of helicopters and the blaring of policé radios. Although many of the members have had basic first aid training, they usually leave actual treatment to the First Aid Squads. They also have taken segments of police auxillary training courses in which they learn to preserve evidence as well as how to approach the scene of a crime.

It is estimated that Hillsborough averages about six to eight searches annually. Fortunately, not all are as intense or dramatic as the search for the teenager who took an overdose of insulin and wandered out into the fields. He was found by the horse unit, about 2:00 a.m., in a semiconscious condition.

The unit will respond to a call for help from any official agency, but discourages farmers seeking help for lost cows. However, they have helped rescue two cows from a watery grave in a river overflowing its banks! We are going to contact this group to see if they would be interested in hearing about the Search and Rescue operation with dogs. If they are we will make arrangements for a joint meeting with a Search and Rescue member present to talk and demonsratate


