

## Fall Match

Our sixth certification match was held on a beautiful fall day, for a change we could have complained that it was a bit too warm, but after nearly freezing last year it was a pleasant change. We had ten tracks run, with four dogs passing. Two of these dogs earned their certifications, the other two showed us the extremes of tracking size wise that is...as our two TD entries showed us their style....Misty the Norwich Terrier, who's brown coat blended so well with the fie d at times it seemed as if Pam Riker was out there alone with a lead to an invisible dog....and then Gypsy and John Miktus doing a super job on a modified TDX track.(it didn't cross any road and it wasn't a full 1000 yards, but it was aged well and had a multitude of cross tracks from the other dogs and many people as it was laid over the fields where two of the other tracks had been run).

On the following two pages are pictures from the match (we hope these have reproduced well, it is our first attempt at trying with black and white photos) and the second page is our catalog from the day marked. The numbers under the pictures are the  $\underline{\text{DOG's}}$  number not the track number.

A paw mote on the match, when I went to deliver a basket of fruit to the burds who are so generous in letting us use their fields I learned that their black Labrador "Pat" who has often visited the matches or practices had been badly injured by a hit and run driver and was not expected to walk again on one leg(the vet had been pushing for amputation). Am very happy to report that they decided they didn't want the dog's leg amputated and when I saw Mr. Burd two weeks later he reported that "Pat" was doing fine, starting to use the leg, in fact he had tried to get to see his lady love down the road which was where he'd been going when he was hit. All's well that ends well.

# Man best friend to only one in 13 dogs

MAN isn't being very nice to his lest friend, the dog. Each day in helters and veterinarian's offices fround the country some 17,500 logs are destroyed, says the U.S. Humane Society.

There are about 41,300,000 pet logs in the country, according to he best statistics. That translates

into one dog for every six people. In all, 43 percent of households own a dog. But only a fourth of those dogs will live to a ripe old age, said Gil Hodges of the Humane Society.

A recent study found that 26 percent of pet dogs will be given away, 18 percent will die in accidents, 6 percent will run away, 9 percent will be abandoned and about 16 percent will die of illness.

"These statistics very definitely indicate that the level of concern and the level of care is less than adequate," said Hodges.

In fact, a recent 10-year study in California found that only one dog in 13 will remain with its original

owner all its life. In all, more than 7.5 million dogs end up in animal shelters each year. But only one in 13 will ever be adopted or returned to its owner.

While most dogs are cremated, some furriers are actually buying cat and dog skins for new fashions, said Hodges.

## Search and Rescue UPDATE

In the spring of 1977 we held a demonstration by the Adirondack Rescue Dog Assoc. and the German Shepherd Search and Rescue, Ramapo Unit to give the public a chance to see these dogs in action.

Two facts that we learned that day that stand out in my mond are that most of the time they are called out to sid after hope of finding the missing per-whereabouts. son alive is minimum and that they are seldom called out dir- and vanished . . . like he was swallowed ectly by the person in charge of the search....until that person is reminded by someone of their exsistence.

This is the area in which we can help....by being aware of cases where they could help and then contacting the person or police in charge of the search of the Rescue dogs and how to contact them.

Publicity generated by our public program led indirectly to their sucessful search for a man in Maryland in 1977. Perhaps if we had notified the above searching efforts of the Rescue Dogs exsistance they could have been of help. We gave out phone numbers at the time of the demonstration and asked that each member contact their local police and give them the numbers. By now these numbers have undoubtly but was picked up by an auto.

# Boy's abduction feared as intense search fails

A massive search all day yesterday for a three-year-old boy missing since Monday morning in rural Burlington County failed to turn up even a clue to his

"It's like he walked out of his house up," said a frustrated Pemberton Township Police Sgt. Roger Pittman. The lack of results in the hunt has led authorities to speculate that the child may have been. abducted.

More than 300 men, including 152 Army trainees from nearby Fort Dix, searched from dawn to dusk for young Arthur Luciani, who walked out of his back door to dump some trash for his mother shortly after 10 a.m. Monday and disappeared.

Two days of "finger tip to finger tip searching" of large wooded tracts, plus a house to house search, did not provide a hint of what happened to Arthur. The boy is described as three-feet tall, 30 pounds, with black curly hair. He is mulatto with a light brown complexion.

"We had men walk the depth of the woods in back of his house, walking five feet abreast, and we turned up nothing," said Pemberton Det. William Randall. who coordinated the intense hunt.

Three blood hounds borrowed from the Ocean County Sheriff's Office, and an Army helicopter from Fort Dix, also were pressed into service, along with a CB radio "React Alert Team" comprised of Air Force personnel and civilians. The group is headquartered at Maguire Air Force base, some five miles from the

Jeanne Smith's Labrador earned her TD at the Suffolk trial also.


Elisa Kiregaard- Bush's poodle Bridgette earned her TD last fall. She passed at the Berks Country and Town and Country's trials.


Johnnie Case's Casey finished his CD title at the Morris Hills show in November.
