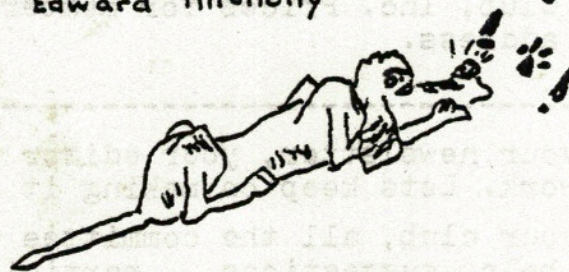

The Training of Avalanche Dogs in Germany

On my recent trip to Germany I met Herr Heigl of Oberammergau in the Bavarian Alps. Herr Heigl is the owner of Ferdl, a 10 year old German Shepherd Dog. Ferdl is a trained Search and Rescue and Avalanche Dog. The dog handler team has been called out many times to rescue people lost under avalanches.

The most famous rescue operation was on the Zugspitze, highest mountain in Germany. After an avalanche hit Schneefernerhaus and swept off the terraces with the people on them. Ferdl and Herr Heigl were on a team of 25 dogs and handlers. Ferdl found a young man who was dead and also a mother with a child in her arms. The mother was dead but the child was still alive, but unfortunately died on the way to the hospital. Altogether 10 people were found in the avalanche.

It takes a lot of hard work and dedication to train these dogs, It is not very hard for a dog with a fine nose to scent the victim, but to create the situation necessary to simulate a disaster is quite another story.

The first step in training an avalanche dog is to teach it how to find an object. After he has mastered that a switchover is made to snow. The dog has to master each problem before going on to the next stage. The article is then slightly covered with snow, gradually increasing the amount of snow cover to get the dog to scratch around for it. After that the handler can start hiding in an open hole. The dog handled by another person will be encouraged to look for his owner. The same procedure is then followed as with the article, by the owner gradually being covered with snow.

When a human being is covered with one meter of snow it takes about one hour for the scent to seep through (body heat). The trainers of avalanche dogs use the method of digging a trench, then a tunnel from the bottom of the trench large enough for the person to lie in. After closing the tunnel and filling in the trench, all signs of digging are removed, by going over with skis, etc. To mark the tunnel two imaginary lines are used in the form of a cross, with the center of the cross over the buried victim. The marker flags are far enough away so that a smart dog can't see them. The handler-victim in the tunnel can bring with him a flashlight and something to read. Communication with the outside world is via walkie-talkie. The tunnel is very warm and there is little oxygen, so that the victim gets very sleepy.

Herr Heigl, the handler of Ferdl, had in one training session been buried for 4 hours. That would be a tunnel covered with 4 meters of snow. Training has to be done very carefully in order to avoid fatal accidents. Someone in Austria once suffocated during the training session because they could not find him in time.

Some very experienced dogs with superier noses are sometimes able to find victims in one half hour under one meter of snow.

The owners finally came and took it away. That had made matters a little more complicated and threw Gypsy off the track. We went back toward the approximate starting point. While we were trying to decide what to do, John laughed and pnted at Ebony. She had found the lead. Gypsy might be the super tracker, but Ebony can steill show her a thing or two.

Thank you Ebony, Gypsy, John and Florence for finding my lead.
Moral: Never loose anything without a good tracking dog about.

Recognition Awards Proposals

At the January Board meeting thorough dicussion was held on an earlier
proposal to the board that we institute a "Recognition Award" for all persons
earning an AKC Tracking Title each year.

At the present we are considering using a decal with a design by John Miktus for the award. Total cost per year including postage for all phases of the project is estimated to be \$90 - \$120.

The main purpose for giving such an award to each dog-handler team (it is recommended that it be retro-active to all club members) is the generate good publicity for the club throughout the country. Such publicity just might give impetus to the AKC on recognizing tracking clubs, it might also serve to inspire other groups to start such clubs.

Thus far two form letters, and a page telling about the club have been drafted. One letter will go to each club holding a tracking test asking for a marked catalog, along with an information sheet about the club itself. The second letter will go to the person whose dog has earned the TD, and will ask them to answer such questions as why did they get started in tracking, do they belong to a tracking club?/

These letters and the information sheet will be read and discussed and voted upon at the next general meeting. The recognition award program would start with tests held from January 1979.

We hope you will be able to attend that meeting to vote upon this important step for our club.

We now feel ready to support you in your efforts with AKC by sending them a report on our first public event, our By-Laws, membership list, etc., asking them to establish a file on us as they have done with Lenape and the Buckeye Club. Of course, we don't anticipate any more success than you had in securing official recognition, but it certainly won't hurt to let them know there are other tracking clubs. In the meantime, we are moving ahead with plans to promote tracking in our area by offering our aid to obedience and all-breed kennel clubs who don't now offer Tests in the hope of persuading them to do so. Most of our members are also members of one or more such clubs, which gives us an "in" with them. Our first venture in this direction will probably be an Advanced Tracking Match, sanctioned, to be put on by New England DTC.

No, don't assume from the above heading that a second local tracking club has been formed! True, you may remember seeing the column in the November NEON of an organization calling itself "The Greater Boston Tracking Club". When last spring we were taking the first halting steps toward the formation of the Club, there was no clear consensus as to what to call ourselves. After considering many alternatives, we have now adopted permanently the less geographically restrictive name of "The Tracking Club of Massachusetts".

At present the TCM membership is made up of the twenty-odd original founders who are its charter members. Starting January 1, we shall be opening membership to others. Our By-Laws specify that applicants must demonstrate a genuine interest in the Club's purposes by first attending three Club meetings.

On November 19 we held our first public event, a Certification Match. AKC requires that with the Tracking Test entry of a dog not already a TD there be submitted a document, signed by an

AKC Tracking judge, stating that in his opinion the dog is ready to compete in such an event. Only two of our nine participants were TDM Members, for in taking entries we gave preference to non-members. The Match was conducted exactly like a regular Test, with tracks plotted the day before. This was good practice for our members, who showed they could work together well in putting on such an event. It also was obviously good preparation for the novice handlers. Ruth Ridings judged, assisted by Art Child, who we hope will eventually become the Club's second AKC judge. The weather was cool but sunny as we assembled on the scheduled day at magnificent fields near the Nashoba Community Hospital in Ayer, kindly made available to us by the Hospital and neighboring owners. Five of the nine dogs -- an excellent record for beginners -- passed and were duly certified by Ruth, which sets them up for entry in the spring Tests. After the Match a bountiful lunch was enjoyed by all, supplied by our members and co-ordinated by Brendan Bolan.

Plans are underway for our next event, a two-day clinic to be conducted by Ruth Ridings in April. Details will be announced in an ad in the March NEON.

Our membership has been well and creditably represented in the autumn Tracking Tests. Passing at Great Barrington on October 15 were Julie Treinis and Briard, Whooki; Carole Bolan and Beagle, Kristina; Linda Bolan and Beagle, Danielle; Bob Parsons and Beardie, Brookie. At Port Chester on October 28 Whooki, Kristina, and Danielle passed again; and at Concord on November 11 Whooki and Kristina passed for a third time. Finally, at Concord the following day, Ted Sprague's Cardigan, Dewines, passed the Advanced Sanctioned Tracking Match.
