# IN MEMORY OF ROYAL

Royal, O'Bre-On's Gyrfalcon Brandy Lane, TD, is gone now. Gone forever to, I hope, a sunlit field somewhere beyond to spend eternity racing across the windswept grasses in pursuit of her dreams. And I am left behind to remember her and heal the wounds of my loss. Part of the healing must be this memorial, a final tribute to a proud, gentle dog who lived every moment of her four and one-half years as if it were the best.

Undoubtedly she was the most talented dog I've ever known, and because she was, she had more friends than many humans. When she died people sent flowers, plants, cards and letters. The phone rang for days and everywhere I went, people stopped me to express their sorrow.

Her talents began emerging when we first met. She was eleven weeks old when Kathy O'Briend introduced us. Shortly after that, I began to teach her to track. Before many weeks passed, I introduced her to obedience class and she excelled. Then, at 16 months of age, she went to Maryland and passed her first Tracking Trial to become the first and only Ibizan with a TD.

Next, came back-packing. In four short weeks she learned to walk, off lead, behind me through forest trails carrying a specially made back-pack which contained our food and supplies. As long as she wore her back-pack, she never left the trail, ignoring squirrels, birds, and many other small animals of the forest habitat. Once we stopped to rest and I removed her pack, she'd bound through the woods to chase whatever wildlife she saw. Then a special whistle signal from me would bring her racing back to the camp-site to lay quietly beside me as we ate and rested.

The breed ring was the least of her favorite activities. It seemed senseless to her and most unrewarding. Though she was truly elegant in form, I did not pursue it because, I, too, found it equally unrewarding. We treasured her few blue ribbons and went on to more exciting horizons.

In all of these activities, Royal had quelled her natural instincts to do what I had asked. Now, after learning to be my hiking companion, I felt she should be given the opportunity to do what Ibizans have been doing for centuries. So, we began lure-coursing. And, oh how she loved it:

She earned her two first place ribbons in short order and continued to add up the points toward her Field Championship. As the motor of the lure machine whined in the wind, she'd jump up and down in anticipation of the chase. And, at the start, it was all I could do to keep her four feet on the ground until we heard that exciting "Tally Ho".


But, now all these things we did together have stopped, so tragically soon for both of us. I could not know that day I took her to the doctor to be spayed that she'd never make it. Ironically, I made the decision to spay for her. No more, I reasoned, would she be in season every spring and fall, just when we wanted most to track and hike and race.

And when she left, she took with her a significant portion of my heart. But I must not think of her as having left for good, for as one mourner wrote, "Wherever Royal is, she's waiting for your - grateful for your training and love." So, Royal, my friend, wait for me. Surely, Sooner or later, we will be together again.

## **FOUNDED in 1975**

The Lenape Tracking Club, Inc. of Hunterdon

County in western New Jersey was formed in June of

1975 by a small group of people interested in tracking. Membership in the club has averaged over 40

persons each year since its founding.

Our purpose in forming the club was to do all in our power to assist people in training their dogs in the sport of tracking, to encourage sportsmanlike competition in tracking tests and to sponsor educational programs of interest to tracking enthusiasts.

To further its goals the club has held fun matches, certifying matches which simulate actual tracking trials, learning and training sessions. In 1979 the club held its first TDX match.

Club members work together in pairs and small groups throughout the year to train their dogs to track, encouraging each other when they have problems and cheering each track well done. The club publishes a Newsletter to keep all members informed of up coming events. Each March we hold a dinner during which we present awards to each member-dog team earning a TD or TDX anywhere during the previous year. One of our most popular events is our annual picnic held in August each year where the dogs are allowed to bring their owners. Highlight of the picnic is an obstacle course where the dogs really put their handlers through the paces.

In 1978 we formed a Scent Hurdle Racing Team and while we have not been too active in this area to date, we hope to really put together a couple of good teams this year.
