

Box 1499, Galesburg, Illinois 61401 (309-375-6944). They are non-restrictive, made of harness leather and come in three sizes, small (24"-31"), medium (29"-39" girth) and large (38"-46" girth). Each is (\$25.00) twenty-five dollars. They also have a Latigo leather tracking harness for smaller breeds, a Toy (13" to 17" girth) and an extra small (17" to 24" girth) for twenty dollars (\$20.00). I have one of those for my Schipperke and it is lightweight and soft. J&J Dog Supplies will send a free catalog upon request.

I hope to see you at the July 9th follow-up and the August picnic. Start collecting items for the Chinese Auction now. Happy tracking!



Frequent inquiries as to how young can you start to train a dog to track and how to proceed with a puppy in tracking training prompted us to request an article from Elissa Kirkegard-Bush who has experience in training puppies to track.

HOW TO PUT YOUR FAITH IN A SEVEN MONTH OLD PUPPY (OR I COULD BE THE MOST GULLIBLE PERSON AROUND)

Tracking a puppy is both rewarding and fun. It channels all of those youthful efforts into something constructive and positive in addition to teaching the puppy to learn our way. A puppy will naturally use its nose to locate you or a kennel mate so why not allow him to "do his thing" following AKC's guidelines?

I usually introduce my puppies to tracking when they are very, very young, around sixteen weeks. We consider tracking to be a series of exercises and we break them all down carefully so the puppy begins to put together a tracking vocabulary. The first thing I do is introduce him to a "glovie", in the house, just playing. I repeat the word over and over again while tossing the glove around and making it fun, fun, fun. I personally do not encourage tug of wars with the glove because I have retrievers that must later on do field work, holding a bird gently and giving it up readily. If you do not plan on any retrieving work, you can pull and tug.

Next I introduce the harness to the puppies. I again do this in the house and usually reward the pup with a biscuit after he has accepted having the harness put on him. One word here, we do have difficulty finding non-restrictive harnesses that will grow with the puppies but

they are so oblivious once they start running and tracking they don't seem to mind if it is a little large. Since the puppies have had no real formal obedience training and have no temptation to look to us for guidance, they have no qualms about dragging you around a field at a fairly fast clip!

As far as method used, I employ Johnson's method of double laying the first straight tracks out and back and then introducing corners slowly one at a time. I find that the puppies are a bit erratic at times, using their noses to air scent or getting distracted by things around them, but generally they are honest and find it to be great fun. Until they are six months old, the longest track I would lay is 300 yards and the oldest I would make it is one-half hour. I try to teach the basics in the spring and if I have to work in the summer or fall, I track in the very early hours at 5:00 or 6:00 A.M.

I do use food but I leave an awful lot of it out in the field because usually the puppies move too fast to stop and pick it up. Ahh.. running. Because of the introduction of TDX, running is being looked upon as undesirable because big mistakes can be made if the dog is moving faster than a trot. However, I attempt to make tracking a big game and often I will run flat out with a pup to keep up his enthusiasm.

I do track with an unrestricted harness and lead but I do not check the youngsters like I do an adult or TDX dog. If the pups overrun a corner, I "correct" by showing great surprise that they would "fib" to me, AND WITH GREAT EXCITEMENT, I show them where the track went.

When I first start corners, I put the article upwind about ten yards so the dog scents it almost as soon as he gets to the corner and he turns. I then continue to successively move it away from the corner in about five yard advances until the leg is about 50 yards long and then I introduce another corner with an article about 10 yards upwind. I continue to lengthen the legs away from the corner until I have worked to about four corners.

When I first start out, I ask the dog to find his "glovie" while I am putting on the harness. When the puppy comes to the glove, I make a great fuss and pull out the food reward. I try to keep the praise up for one minute and tell him how wonderful it is to find the "glovie".

If I find the dog has trouble with starts or corners, I pepper the area with hot dogs every five to ten yards to self-motivate him and to reconfirm the connection in his mind that the human scent brings him to the glove and I am just overjoyed when he locates my missing glove.

I attempt to put the TD on a dog as his first title before he is fifteen months old for severral reasons. I feel the structured routine of Novice obedience is too advanced for a puppy to concentrate solely on. Physically, it helps to develop my breed dogs' hind quarters without stressing the body. As I have said before, a puppy will naturally use its' nose so you don't have to teach it to track, just to use its' nose in accordance with AKC rules. Finally, and most important, I feel the confidence that is instilled in these puppies as a result of our following them around and believing in them carries with them for the rest of their life, not to mention the unique bond that is felt when you and your puppy are all alone in a field working a problem out together.

At our Annual Picnic we will be having a Chinese Auction. So there is no confusion for new members who may be attending the picnic here is a brief description of what a Chinese Auction is:


