



BERNESE MOUNTAIN DOG CLUB OF AMERICA, INC. TRACKING TEST

MAY 17, 1985

On Thursday morning the judges for the test, Mrs. Carole Crothers and Ms. Elissa J. Kirkegard, the Tracking Test Committee Chairperson Ms. Fran Wilmeth, and Ms. Mary Stuart, Tracklayer met at the fields to plot the tracks for the test. The judges and tracklayers went to each field and planned the track by walking it leaving flags at the start, at thirty yards, at each corner and the end. They also drew a map of the track with landmarks on it so they would know for sure were the track was when the dog was working it. They plotted four tracks in case they needed a spare track. Fran and Mary were each assigned two tracks to lay the following morning.

May 17, 1985 Tracking Test

What a day....the weather cooperated beautifully, a light rain the night before after weeks of dry weather, no breezes, and moderately tall grass fields combined to make the tracks ideal.

There were three entries, just enough to make it count for those entered who had dogs without their "T". Promptly at 9:00 AM the Show Secretary, Mrs. Mary Lou Tingley had the handlers draw for their tracks.

The judges and trackleyers had gone to the fields at 8:30 to start laying the first two tracks. The judges watched as Mary laid Track 1 and Fran laid Track 2. Each trackleyer walked the track they were assigned, leaving only the first two flags, and dropping a glove where the last flag had been. Then they returned to tell the handler who had drawn Track 1 that they were ready. The Track in a test must be a minimum of a half hour old.

Dog #1 was Wyemede's Aquila V, Butik, T.D. owned by Peg Forte & Steffie D'Ambola, handled by Peg. The pressure was on this team that drew the first track of the day to do well, as this dog had earned her "T" before. (Dogs with a "T" may enter a Tracking Test if it has not filled with dog seeking their "T".) The first leg was a long one of 160 yards and they took their time. Peg backed up twice waiting for Quila to convince her that the track truly went on straight. Finally Quila made the commitment and once she made the first turn she really began tracking. She ate some wet grass along the way and right at the last turn she decided to sit down in front of Peg to spit some of it out. It seemed like an eternity, but it was probably only ten seconds, when Quila got up, made the last turn and trotted down the track towards the glove. When she found it, they heard a loud cheer from the gallery watching from the corner of the field, what a welcome sound. Time to complete the track was 15 minutes.

The second track of the day was drawn by Ch. Shepherd's Patch Elise and her owner-handler Mary Horstcik Eschweiler, from Hartland,

Wisconsin. Their track was in a large field with a slight slope, which meant we could not see all of the track. They got off to a good start, and for a while were out of sight. But it wasn't long before we saw them again, Elise tracking away. She soon dipped her head and came up with a glove, and again a loud cheer from the gallery. Her track time was eight minutes.

The third track of the day was Weyrburn's Grande Damia, owned by Kathy and Christopher Milar from Hagertown, Indiana. This bitch took right off, with Kathy running behind her much of the time, as the dog pulls hard and moves right out. When they got to the last turn the dog didn't seem to sure as to where the turn went (there was a definite change of cover from tall grass to low wild strawberry patches at this point). After what must have seemed like an enternity to Kathy, Damia struck out strongly and soon located the glove. An enthusiastic response from the gallery again. (One of the nice things about tracking is all the dog's can pass in a test, there is not one best dog.) Track time was 6 minutes.

A clean sweep, with all dogs passing their test. Many members of the gallery had never seen tracking before, and were duly impressed. After returning from the last trrack we found some more people had arrived and had missed seeing the dogs track. So Fran went out and laid the spare track and later Judge Carol Crithers ran her male Rottweiler, Rommel on the track so those people got to see a dog track too.

At the Judge's dinner Gloria Henes thanked the Lenape Tracking Club for their help in putting on the Test. We in turn welcomed their thanks and thanked the BMDCA for giving us the opportunity to have the experience of putting on a Tracking Test. Tracking has not always been held in conjunction with the BMDCA Speciality, but I think all who were present would again it is well worth the effort to see some of our dogs actually working. This was the second time Tracking was available in the East at the Speciality, and so far the record stands that all have passed in the East. May that record continue in the future.

My own special thanks to Fran and Mary Lenape members, JUdges Lisa Kirkegard and Carol Crothers, to Mary Lou Tingley, Show Secretary who was present in body and spirit despite a Briard bitch ready to whelp at home (she's called in a friend to assist) and the Show Committee and spectators for coming to watch. And last but not least, to the Bernese Mountain Dog Club of America for including the Tracking Test in the Specialty. THANK YOU ONE AND ALL.

TRACKING EXPERIENCE DAY 1985

The cover was short enough for little dogs but tall enough to make the tracks easier to follow. A just about perfect day. And the people came! Of the forty handler/dog teams entered, thirty-seven arrived on schedule. One of the eight spectators entered had her dog along and filled in for one of the missing teams. Thirty-six people have signed up for the first follow-up day (June 8th).

Charlotte Schwartz was fresh from a long stay in the Austrailian summer sun. She kept her audience entertained as she educated them in the intricacies of scent work and tracking dog handling. The nine group leaders put their dogs and handlers through Day One of the Johnson method, teaching track laying along with getting dogs started on their tracking careers. By the end of the afternoon, many participants were talking about the fun both they and their dogs had experienced, no body left early.

The day was well recorded. Charlotte's morning presentation is now on video tape. During the afternoon a camera crew from Channel 69 in Allentown, PA. filmed many of the beginning dogs and also filmed two short tracks, one run by June Oswald's TDX Labrador, Chipper, and one run by Laurella Mc Clelland's TDX Papillion, Cory. We hope to obtain a video tape of the edited story when it appears on T.V. (We have it!)

Tracking Experience Day 1985 was an unqualified success. The Chairman extends her heartfelt thanks to all the Lenape members who made the day possible. There were new faces among the group leaders which were most welcome. The usual core of faithful club workers did their part, also. The Club couldn't function with out them. And then there's the generosity of Jane Henderson who makes her lovely farm available for club use each year. And Charlotte's expertise assures a top quality program each year. Thank you one and all.

Computer rescue for lost pets

CHICAGO — Two million pets may be lost forever in pet shelters each year because no one knows how to get in touch with their owners.

That's the estimate of Alpo Petfoods Inc., which has endorsed a new computerized system, the National Pet Locators Network, that could keep a lost pet from being a lost cause.

An ordinary pet tag usually contains the pet's name and possibly the owner's name, telephone number and address.

But the Pet Locators tag contains a

computerized, coded membership number and a national toll-free number that is available 24 hours a day for that one call that could bring owner and lost pet together.

When a pet owner calls to report an animal missing, the National Pet Locators Network will call all local animal shelters, according to Tyrone Allen, group marketing manager for

Alpo.
"And we don't quit," he added. "A
couple of days after that, we send out
a 'pet-gram' as a reminder to the
shelter. If we still haven't found the
pet, we might run an ad in local
newspapers."

For the finder, a cat or dog's tag contains instructions to call the network's toll-free number. The network's computer contains instructions on how to contact the owner or a designated friend, relative or veterinarian.

The fee is \$9.95 for the first year, \$5 for each additional year. Coupons for registration are included in Alpo ads appearing nationally in newspapers; they also will be inserted in Alpo products. SEEING EYE VISIT

Greg Forte's second Seeing Eye puppy (Polly - Labrador Retriever) has completed her training in Morristown. Fran Wilmeth and Mary Stuart accompanied Greg and Peg to watch Polly go through her paces in the rain. They were good sports, Fran taking pictures looking through a plastic bag to protect the camera with Mary running along side holding the umbrella over the photographer. Polly's trainer Ramon said she is one of the very best dogs he has trained during his 19 years at the Seeing Eye. Greg will receive a photo of Polly and a letter telling him where she has gone with her blind master soon. His third puppy (Gina-German Shepherd) is already nearly six months old.

When your kid becomes involved with raising puppies for the Seeing Eye trhough 4-H, the whole family becomes involved. This year I offered to help find speakers and demonstrations for the Puppy Camp being held June 7Th and 8th. So now many Lenape members are on the schedule. On Friday night the Hug-A-Tree program will be presented, and on Saturday morning Millie Curtis talk and do a demonstration of Search and Rescue work with Strider, and also will show the kids how you train puppies for Search work with her new puppy, Boulder. After lunch Charlotte Schwartz will be talking with the kids on the importance of socializing their puppies. Charlotte is excited about the opportunity to see 70+ Seeing Eye puppies, living, eating and sleeping with thier "kids". She is looking forward to this opportunity to do research and photography for her new book on puppies. And I will be with a lot of familiar faces.

For the teenagers at Puppy Camp, we have developed a 4-H Trivial Pursuit game, full of dog questions. A Tracking version of this game will be unveiled (and played) at the big shinding on June 29th. So you have been warned....study hard.

Many club members have been asking questions about the Seeing Eye, and we realized that few have ever visited the Seeing Eye. So arrangements have been made for up to 20 members of the Tracking Club to have a tour of the Seeing Eye in Morris Township on Thursday, October 17, 1985 at 10:15. MORE FOR THE T.D.X. HOPEFULS

On the following page you will find some more information borrowed with permission from Shirley Hammond of the Palo Alto Foothills Tracking Association. This is more information to go along with the article that was in the Jan/Feb Common Scents.

The track laid for the TDX dog in training should be assigned parameters from this list. For example a track laid could be 2.5 hours old, with cross tracks laid at 1.5 hours later, the length of the track could be 800 yards, and the degree of difficulty could be 4 because the tracklayer put in an acute corner, the track goes through marsh grass and mustard, and through a barbed wire fence. By keeping a log book record and varying the assigned parameters from this list you can ensure that your dog has been exposed to a variety of situations thereby making him truly ready for that TDX Test.

T.D.X. PARAMETERS TO PRACTICE:

Assigned parameters:

Time: 2, 2.5, 3, 3.5, 4, 4.5

Cross Tracks: 01.0, 01.5, Group, Older than track

Length: 300, 400, 500, 600, 800, 1000, 1200

Difficulty: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6


