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CERTIFICATION MATCH



CLEVER CANINE COMPANIONS

Clever Canine Companions offers three working dog titles (VCC-Versatile Canine Companion, VCCX - Versatile Canine Companion Excellent and O-VCCX - Outstanding Versatile Canine Companion Excellent) with a special Dog of Merit award for the dog with the most points accumulated at the end of the year. A plaque is also given to the person who has done outstanding work in the "dog field." This is "The Extra Mile".

These titles are open to mixed breeds as well as pure breeds.

Many titles (Ch, TD, TDX), as you will see, can be used toward the VCC, VCCX titles.

There are 10 categories. All phases of dog performances are considered. There are many "Open" portions that can be used also.

Category 1 is required. This is a service oriented program. Its purpose is to show the public how much more valued a well socialized and well trained dog can be. This category is a team effort of both the owner's and dog's work. In Category 1 the owner gets credit for all the hours and years of volunteer work. Examples would be: assisting your dog clubs in any manner, instructing or assisting, writing articles, visiting nursing homes

or schools (give dates). As many as 3 points can be given to the dog's score in Category 1. When you have accomplished the proofs for Category 1, it applies to all your dogs.

Other categories include health certificates, obedience, tracking, conformation, herding, protection, draft work, soundness, and other (hero dog, therapy, etc.) Anything else the dog has done (with verifications), awards received, booth points, all can be applied toward these titles. Booth points are given for day-long programs such as pet fairs, rescue fairs and demonstrations, etc. (Min. 4 hours).

The VCC titles requires 5 points from a minimum of 3 categories.

The VCCX title requires 10 points from a minimum of 5 categories.

The O-VCCX requires a previous title, 6 categories and a minimum of 25 points.

A newsletter is published in February, listing all dogs registered and their accomplishments.

Clever Canine Companions also offers a certificate for dogs who do therapy work. The dog does not have to belong to an organization, but proofs of visits are required.

TRAINING TOOL

A rolled-up newspaper can be an effective training tool when used properly. For example, use the rolled-up newspaper if your dog chews something or has a housebreaking accident ...

Take the rolled-up newspaper and hit yourself on the head as your repeat the phrase, "I forgot to watch my dog, I forgot to watch my dog." This is the only time a rolled-up newspaper should be used in training. If your dog laughs at you when you do this, praise him.

WHAT IS A JUDGE

A judge is ... an odd person, who gives up weekends to travel on planes, that are always late, to strange places for the purpose of acquiring sore feet, indigestion, and often, a hangover. A mathematical genius with a computerized brain, a soft heart, and a gift for diplomacy, who can exist for long periods of time without going to the bathroom.
