Go out and try this scenario with your tracking dog, keep track of the age of the track, weather conditions, land conditions, etc. Let us know how you make out.



I do many dog sports but none compare to tracking. To work with an experience tracking dog and watching and feeling him/her actively search out that scent is the best feeling one can experience in dog work. That is what captured me back in 1979 and my love of this incredible sport has increased. As a judge I get emotional whenever I see a good working team in harmony with one another and to see them succeed is a feeling that is indescribable.

I passed my first TD in 1981 and first TDX in 1982. I became a TD Judge in 1984 and a TDX Judge in 1986 with the VST Judgeship when that started.

I founded the Hudson Valley Tracking Club in 1988 and have been their Training Director form that time to present. The Hudson Valley Tracking Club has members from all over the East Coast including members of this club.

My indoctrination to Tracking took place back in 1979 and did a little tracking and met Lydia Strawbridge that year and started tracking with her. She saw me start to track and my ineptitude back then. She grabbed the lead out of my hand and yelled "What the Hell did you do to this dog!!!?" and from that point on I learned from the best. I learned what tracking is all about from this incredibly knowledgeable person. I read as much as I could about scent and got totally suckered into this sport and will try to stay in this sport as long as I am able.

Art Twiss

I have been involved with Rottweiler's since 1960 and the sport of tracking since the fall of 1968. I've helped train over 75 dogs to the TD title and about 25 to the TDX title. I have put tracking titles on 6 of my 8 Rottweilers (#8 is still in training) over the years.

I owned and trained Grunberg Brummel von der Adel Am & Can TD who holds the record for Rottweilers for the most consecutive TD's passed (13 of 13). He died one week before going to Canada for their TDX test.


I also owned and trained Orenda von Arba who was the first Rottweiler bitch to get the TDX title the first time out in the US and Canada.

I have judged at numerous TD trials since 1981: TDX shortly thereafter and at VST trials, since it's inception, in various parts of the country.

I was a co-founder of the Tracking Club of Massachusetts (I'm currently serving as President) and served as an officer or director of TCM since its inception in 1977. Served as tracking instructor for the Concord Massachusetts Dog Training Club for over 6 years. I've written several tracking articles that have been featured in various books and magazines. From Flemington / Whitehouse: (Route 22 or Route 78): Take 523 North to Oldwick and Route 517 (523 turns right across from Hildebrandt Nurseries just before you enter Oldwick - stay straight and you will be on Route 517). Go through Oldwick and continue on Route 517 to Fairmount. At the traffic light by the Fairmount Methodist Church (little white church with white steeple and red doors) diagonally across from cemetery, turn left onto Route 512. The Christie Hoffman Farm driveway is the third driveway on the left.

From Chester / Long Valley: Take Route 24 and 513 to Route 517 South (left turn at light in Long Valley). AKC Suspension


In the August 2002 AKC Gazette it was reported that a person named "Nancy Gauthier (Andover, MA) was suspended by the Tracking Club of Massachusetts for conduct at their event on May 5, 2002. Specifically Ms. Gauthier was charged with disruptive public criticism of a judge. The AKC Management Disciplinary Committee acted to suspend Ms. Gauthier from all AKC event privileges for a period of three months, effective May 20, 2002 and imposed a \$300 fine."

We are bringing this to our members attention to remind them to be careful in their conduct at a tracking test or any other AKC event. Tracking judges get reimbursed for their traveling expenses and we always give them a gift. But they give up two to four days of their lives to judge these events. They always deserve to be treated with respect.

There are proper channels to follow if one feels a judge has not done their job in a fair manner according to the rules. If you have a complaint you should go to a member of the committee of the club holding the event. If you choose to do so you should have at least one witness to back up your compliant.

Please remain aware that at all AKC events if you are abusing your dog you could be subject to a public reprimand and a fine or suspension and a fine.

In each issue of the AKC Gazette people who have been reprimanded or suspended are listed. We seldom see it for something that happened at a tracking event. We don't ever want to ever see it happen at a Lenape event.



Tracking Bees

CNN news reports from Albuquerque, NM that researchers are working with the Defense Department to find out if honeybees can be used to detect buried land mines. Chemists at Sandia National Laboratory are conducting the research.

University of Montana scientists have discovered that bees foraging for pollen and nectar pick up dust, soil and other particles on their bodies and bring them back to the hive. Those particle can include explosives such as TNT, a primary ingredient in many land mines.

Now bees are explosives, every even your perfulike a swarm of

Now bees are being trained to "sniff" for explosives, eventually for drugs, maybe even your perfume or specific body scent... like a swarm of tiny bloodhounds. ...

"All land mines leak explosives into the environment," said Phil Rodacy, a land mine specialist at Sandia. "If you can get bees to go into that area they'll then collect the explosive signatures that are coming off the mines, they'll bring it back to the hive and we can detect it using various chemical sensors."

Bees bring pollen back to the hive on their back legs after a morning of foraging.

"We're testing pollen, we're testing bees, we're testing honey, anything that may have a trace of TNT," said Sandia beekeeper Gary Bender.

"And if everything works out with this project., it will be easy to deploy a box wherever you think land mines are, and then you just look at the bees."

The researchers have set up a greenhouse experiment to study how plants incorporate explosive residue into their systems. Inside the greenhouse, they also are looking at how bumblebees deal with TNT-tainted plants.

And Sandia has set up a field of land mines, minus the fuses.

"It allows us to observe the bees to see whether or not they're in the area," Rodacy said. "We can also take samples of the plants to see how much explosive is actually coming out of the mine and getting into the environment."

Ultimately, researchers hope to train the bees to actually go and find buried mines, sort of a game of "hive and go seek."

So how do you train a bee?

"We take a small feeder, place it near the bee hive and then get the bees used to going back and forth to that feeder," Rodacy said.

"Then we move that feeder farther and farther away from the hive, then cover it and the bees tend to follow that feeder. Since there's explosive crystals near the feeder, they associate that smell of the explosives with their food source."

Sandia says its preliminary research looks promising.

"The project is at a stage where you could deploy bees in an area that you thought had explosives," Rodacy said. "If there were a high enough concentration of explosives in a field, you would be able to detect it in the hive."

> The scientists plan to do at least two more years of testing, including a live land mine experiment next year. If all goes well, they hope to use bees for real land mine detection within five years.

From Ananova: Bomb-sniffing honey bees are being trained in the US as a new tool to fight terror attacks.

Pentagon scientists have succeeded in making hives ignore flowers and instead swarm around traces of explosives.

Bees have extreme sensitivity to molecular trails and are able to scour every minute part of an area as they search for food.

"It appears bees are at least as sensitive or more sensitive odours than dogs," Dr Alan Rudolph, who is overseeing the operation, told the New York Times.

One plan being considered is to place a hive of trained bees near important security checkpoints and use them to guard against possible bomb attack by terrorists. The swarming detection system could also be used to find truck bombs and land mines.

Scientists used sugar-water rewards to condition bee colonies to hunt for DNT, a residue of TNT, in 99% of cases.

After one bee is trained to follow a different scent, it transfers the knowledge to others and within hours the entire hive, and often other nearby hives, have switched to the new smell.

A special radio transmitter the size of a grain of salt, due to be tested in the next few weeks, could allow individual bees to be tracked as they follow parts of bomb ingredients to their source.

Bees could also be used for sniffing out illegal drugs, which are easier to trace than explosives, the scientists said.

Pentagon officials told the paper that the idea of bomb-sniffing factors has a "giggle factor" that makes it hard to sell. Bees also have limitations, and do not work at night, in storms or in cold weather.


