FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

It is June already and Lenape events are in full swing. Since my last report the Club has been busy. We had a successful TED in early April along with three follow-ups. Thanks to the many members who helped to make this a credit to the Club. In May, we held a VST seminar which received rave reports. Thanks to Peg Forte, Lisa Pattison and Carol Shields for making this a successful seminar.

As you may know, AKC is in the process of updating the Tracking Regulations. One of the proposed changes involves a Test Worker Option. This option, would allow Clubs to set aside a limited number of tracks for working club members as defined and identified by the Club. This option would increase the likelihood that these members would get into the test and will probably be effective in 2010.

In anticipation of this change, the Board discussed how Lenape should position itself so we could take advantage of the opportunity to help members get into tests. As a result, we voted to expand the 2010 TD from 8 to 9 tracks, which would allow us to shield 3 (rather than 2) of the total tracks for working

club members. Given our current fields, this should be fairly easy to do.

With regard to TDX, we have asked Alice Crans to see if we can find enough additional fields around the Hagedorn Center to expand from 3 to 5 TDX tracks. This would allow us shield 1 track for members. Since at this point we are not sure what fields are available, we have not committed to the additional tracks for 2010.

The Board also started its initial discussion of "What is a working member?" Numerous ideas were presented - from a simple list of members who have worked at an event to a point system which would assign different numeric values for work performed. Given the fact that we wanted to get input from club members, we tabled the discussion. If you have some thoughts on "What should qualify as a working member" please let me or another Board member know. We would like to have a policy in place later this year.

Until next time, keep on tracking.


I always enjoyed the camaraderie at Lenape. I kept up my membership all those

The participants were enthusiastic and brought a variety of breeds with an assortment of tracking styles. But within a short time, most of them "got it".



VST SEMINAR reported by Peg Forte

The first weekend of May, Jerry Lewis came from Iowa to lead a seminar on Variable Surface Tracking. Twelve LTC members and two others signed up for the seminar that was held in Flemington, NJ in an industrial park area. We were fortunate to have the use of Arc Industries, a day program site for The Arc of Hunterdon County. Jerry shared with the participants his journey to the VST with his Golden Retriever, Chammy. All throughout the seminar Jerry gave us a positive message that we can do the VST with our dogs. He made many points about the mistakes he made along the way to achieving his goal to earn the VST and the CT (Champion Tracker) titles. He stressed that we should not make those same mistakes.

On Saturday we each worked our dogs on different components of the VST – the importance of practicing many starts was emphasized. Transitioning from vegetation to asphalt was also tried.

On Sunday, Jerry laid a VST track in the industrial complex. He asked for volunteers to work the track. First would be a dog to do the start and get to the second article. Then a second volunteer would do from the third article to the last article. The third volunteer would do the entire track. Cheryl Mathews yellow Labrador, Grady, did the first part. The track started (start article was a sock) on grass, crossed and proceeded across a parking lot, down a concrete sidewalk across another parking lot to the second article (plastic) on the pavement. Then Donna Ellis's Schipperke Gracie began the track at the third article on grass, towards a building paralleled the building onto another parking lot that included a MOT (Moment of truth) turn, continued for a long straight leg down the center of the driveway to the

last article. The gallery followed the two dogs and their handlers, so by the time the third dog (Peg Forte's Pembroke Welsh Corgi) Torrie, was brought to the start there were many scents on the tracks, very much like what would happen in a VST test. Jerry's enthusiasm for our sport of tracking and his sense of humor made the seminar hours fly by. Carol Shields provided the food for both days - and as usual no one went away hungry. Thanks also goes to Lisa Pattison who picked Jerry up at Newark airport and made arrangements for him to stay with a friend of hers in the Flemington area. Each of the participants received a copy of Jerry's book, "VST, A Journey Worth Pursuing." The proceeds of his book are donated to Golden Retriever rescue.

TRACKER'S DISEASE

A Mental Disorder reprinted from the Palo Alto Foothills Tracking Assn. Gone Trackin', April, 1993

A new disease has been discovered that is spreading across the nation in near epidemic proportions. The disease is characterized by the following symptoms:

- a. Missing meals regularly.
- b. Being annoyed by wind: particularly in the earlier stages of the disease.
- c. The tendency towards hoarding leather gloves and other small objects.
- d. The habit of wandering about in fields with a dog at all times of day or night.
- e. Continually searching for new fields to wander in.
- f. Being unable to drive past a field without picturing


- yourself and your dog wandering through it.
- g. Being unable to walk anywhere at all without counting your paces.
- h. A fondness for rain and rubber boots.
- i. A phobia for dry grass and foxtails.

The disease is highly contagious and may be chronic, although it has never been known to be fatal. In 1977, in the California area, a few cases were diagnosed for the first time in many years. Within three years, the disease had spread in the state to many thousands of diagnosed cases and many suspected cases.

There is no known cure. In a few cases, the disease is self limiting and never quite develops or simply goes away by itself. In most cases, however, it goes on for months and even years. Possession of an AKC Tracking or Schutzhund title will give some relief and may cause the disease to subside temporarily. However, the disease frequently reoccurs after a period of remission. The recurrence is usually associated with the acquisition of a new dog. There have been recent diagnosed cases of an advanced form of the disease. When this advanced stage is reached, the prognosis is doubtful.
